Egypt Long Inhabited

Sir Flinders Petrie, the noted British archeologist, has discovered in Egypt near Asyut, relics of a civilization similar to that which existed in England 3000 B. C.

Beneath the site of the oldest known habitation in Egypt he found a still older settlement. Flint instruments, ivory statuettes, pottery, and other things than any made subsequently in Egypt, and other relics link the early civilization of Asia, Europe and Africa.

The antiquity of this early Egyptian civilization was arrived at by a study of the floods of the Nile.—Pathfinder Magazine.
