The Greatest Geyser
By all means the greatest geyser known is in New Zealand, called Waimangu, which has been known to throw black water, stones and mud to a distance of 1,500 feet in the air. This eruption takes place with more or less regularity every 36 hours, but its schedule is subject to variations and it sometimes starts off unexpectedly with terrible fierceness so that visitors to the spot must keep at a very respectful distance or they may be caught in the great flow which issues from the vent. The lives of two girls and a guide were sacrificed because of their defying the advice that had been given them and they were all swept into the hole, where their bodies were afterward found terribly burned by the hot material which was thrown up by the geyser.

Undesirable Immigrant
One class of immigrants that our laws have not been able to keep out is the Flemish flies that come over from Antwerp every summer. The insects, which have a long and curious history, bite as if they were a cross between a yellow jacket and the big black-and-white wasps that the Vermont farmers call "Hollsteins." They are said to have reached Antwerp more than three hundred and fifty years ago, on Spanish ships that came from Central America. Fortunately they seem not to breed here, but either die out or return on the vessels that bring them.—Youth's Companion.
