In view of the bulk and general inconvenience of copper coinage, the commissariat of finance proposes to issue a new coinage of five, three and two kopek values, composed of an alloy of bronze and other metals. The Leningrad mint has been instructed to prepare various samples on the pattern of foreign coinage."
