


## Meeting Emergencies

### THE PAROLE FARCE

During the past few months there has been a whole lot of discussion about the parole system now in vogue in this state. Many have claimed that the Michigan parole system is too easy on the prisoners. Without discussing the merits of the particular complaints, it is a fact that we are too easy on criminals. It is too easy to commit crime, too easy to escape conviction and too easy to get out of jail once you are in.

In a Western paper recently appeared an editorial that will probably appear a trifle facetious. Yet it has more truth than fancy:

"Applicants for parole appear before the board from time to time. Authentic accounts of the proceedings are lacking, but in their absence we may reconstruct from various happenings an idea of what goes on—perhaps something like this:

"Board: The prisoner's record during commitment is excellent. Is there any criminal history previous to commitment?

"Prisoner: Burglary, highway robbery, arson, theft and assault and battery, but never had a drink. Arrested, 1910. Convicted, 1919. Paroled, 1920. Arrested, 1920. Convicted, 1925. Up for parole.

"Board: What is the prisoner's character, if any?

"Prisoner: Excellent.

"Board: Will the prisoner be good if he is paroled again?

"Prisoner: Be glad to.

"Prisoner is released after being told to go to Mexico. After he departs shots are heard near at hand, followed by more shots. The ambulance, detective's touring car, police patrol, coroner's car and gun squads rush by. More shots.

"Curtailed."


