THE PAROLE FARCE

During the past few months there has been a whole lot of discussion about the parole system on win vogue in this state. Many have claimed that the Michigan parole system is too easy on the prisoners. Without discussing the merits of the particular complaints, it is a fact that we are too easy on criminals. It is too pasy to commit crime, too easy to escape convictions and too easy to get out of jail once you are in. In a Western paper recently appeared an editorial that will probably appear a trifle facetious. Yet it has more truth than fancy:
"Applicants for parole appear before the board from time to time. Authentic accounts of the proceedings are lacking, but in their absence we may reconstruct from various happenings an idea of what goes on—perhaps something like this:
