Astronomy Not Alone

of Sentimental Value

Although you may never have the adventurous experience of being set adrift in a lifeboat or being lost among the clouds, nevertheless, we think you will enjoy this description by Elmer R. Collins, nautical expert of the Navy department, of the "Clock in the Sky."

If you were to blindfold an expert navigator of a modern ocean liner, ship him to any of the world's seven seas, transport him to any of the various points of the compass, either in the direction of the warm tropical waters of the South Sea isles, or toward the cold stormy seas of the frigid zones, and then after removing the bandage from his eyes, you were to supply him with nautical almanac, sextant, and chronometer, set to the time of Greenwich, in 20 minutes, after he has observed the altitude of a couple of stars, his whereabouts will be known to him within a mile or so. Is not this an amazing triumph for the worth and usefulness of precise

astronomy? Surely the movements of these numerous cosmic bodies are for other purposes than sentimental star gazing.

Artist Inspired by

Grandeur of Alaska

The resurrection of Christ receives an Alaskan setting in a painting by Jan Van Empel, on the records of Saint Peter's Protestant Episcopal church, at Seward, Alaska. The painting was done at the request of Bishop Peter T. Dowe of the Alaska diocese, who met Van Empel when the latter was touring the northland in search of inspiration.

The upper portion of the work shows the figure of the risen Christ surrounded by ministering angels. Views of the mountains and of the waters of Resurrection bay, at which Seward is situated, form the horizon. In the lower foreground on either side of the opened tomb are grouped representative characters of Alaska's population.

"Alaska is full of inspiration for the painter," declared Van Empel. "The country is rough and harsh, the characters rugged. It is nature in a freezing mood."

Handy Flashlamp

A new flashlight, designed to aid the man who needs both hands on the job has just been developed by a New York manufacturer, says the Scientific American.

It differs from the conventional style of flashlight in that the lens is on the side instead of at the end. It is equipped with a steel clip, which makes it possible to attach the flashlight to a belt or pocket and throw a beam of light upon the task to be done, leaving both hands free for the work. It is particularly adapted for linemen in the employ of public

service corporations; for night repairmen in industrial plants; for maintenance gangs; for repair gangs on bridges, culverts, tunnels, etc., and for the lone motorist with engine trouble or a puncture.
