New Art History Recorded
As a result of the Italian archeologists' work in North Africa it has been found that the twice-destroyed Temple of Apollo at Cyrene was first built by the Greeks about 600 B. C. and was first reconstructed by the same race 400 years later, when it had been destroyed by fire. The reconstruction work included the addition of much decoration about which little had been heretofore known. Greek culture, it has been established, was as flourishing then in North Africa, as it was in Athens, a fact considered highly important.

Dominica Being Explored
In the West Indies group there is an island known as Dominica, which is to be the basis of another biological survey. The Bruce Museum of Natural History and Art is undertaking the expedition for the purpose of studying marine and other life that abounds there. The investigation will also provide an opportunity for trying out a new chemical process for preserving marine life. It is planned to establish a permanent station.
