The railroads of Michigan, through the Michigan Railroad Association, are placing the railroad situation before the people of the state in a series of advertisements, the first of which appears in the press this week. The managements, in many instances realizing doubtless that they deserved some measure of the public reprobation to which they were exposed, grided themselves for the large task which now they have in a great degree accomplished.

They had to spend much time and huge sums of money in getting ready to do the things which last year they seem to have achieved. They put the new money into better equipment and better plant facilities. Now they are harvesting from that sowing a crop which they have a right to contemplate with pride. They are appealing to the public for fair play and the public will respond; through this free discussion of railway problems the public will have a better understanding of their situation as carriers than ever before.

In a certain section of New York state, particularly in the Adirondack region, beavers have increased in such numbers that they have become a serious menace to the deer and trout. Their dam building operations have flooded many of the finest deer yarding areas, depriving the deer of winter quarters, and have created large lakes out of what once were fine trout streams. The parent stock of these beavers came from Yellowstone park after the original New York stock had become exterminated.

Regiment Knew Only  
Obedience to Orders

One of the most amusing items in Mr. Balleff's entertaining book is the "Wooden Soldiers." "One day," he told me, "I discovered a volume of Russian legends in a pile of children's books, in one of which I found a tale of the Czar Paul I. Over one hundred years ago this powerful monarch was reviewing a favorite regiment in St. Petersburg. ## Wolves and Wild Boars

As a consequence of the bitter cold and the heavy snowfalls many wolves and wild boars have descended from the mountains and made their appearance on the Carpo and in other parts of the Julian Venetia in Italy.

One night wolves besieged the station of Prestane-Matteina, near Trieste, where the employees barricaded the building and defended themselves. The wolves disappeared only at dawn. At San Pietro del Carso, two big wild boars were killed. One of them weighed over 600 pounds. A number of wild boars appeared in the province of Savona along the Riviera. Two were killed. In Umbria wolves are reported to be ravaging the countryside. A reward of 100 lire (over \$15) for each wolf shot is being offered by various municipalities.

## Ancient Manuscript Bible

If, as reported, the Soviet government of Russia transfers the contents of the Petrograd museum to one of the churches in the city, the building thus honored will become the repository of at least one priceless relic, which will be in keeping with the church. That is the Codex Sinaiticus, one of the earliest translations of the Bible. This was discovered in 1859 in a monastery on Mount Sinai, and presented to Czar Alexander II. It is believed to be the oldest known manuscript of the Old and New Testament, and probably was written some time during the Fourth century.

## Last of Fighting Brigade

Charles H. Riley of Mount Vernon, N. Y., was the sole member of the five infantry regiments of Meagher's Irish brigade to attend the annual commemoration of the battle of Fredericksburg held recently in New York city. Besides Riley, there are only four survivors of the famous New York brigade, and they were kept at home by the weight of years. Wives and daughters of veterans kept Riley company.—The Argonaut.

## Wild Animals Kill Many

In British India alone last year it is reported 3,605 persons were killed by wild animals and 20,000 died from snake bites. Tigers accounted for 1,693 deaths, wolves for 835, leopards for 464 and crocodiles took the lives of 813. The wild pigs killed more than 100; bears and elephants about 70. During the year about 23,000 wild animals were killed, so that the ratio of human to wild animal deaths in the jungle is only about one to six.
