About twenty young people from Temple Baptist Church, Detroit, came out last Sunday evening and conducted the B. Y. P. U. meeting at the local Baptist church.

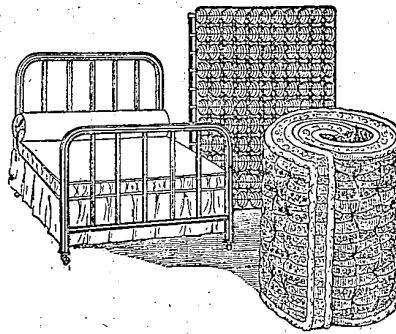

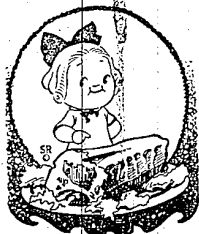

FARM WAGES SHOWN

The department of agriculture reports that for Michigan the average farm wages are slightly higher than one year ago. The rate by the month with board is \$41 and without board, \$37.25. Last year, they were \$40 and \$35, respectively. The day rate av-

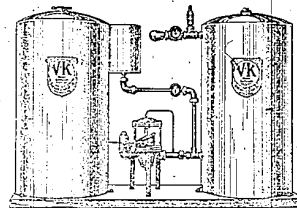
erages \$2.50 with board and \$3.25 without board. One year ago, they were \$2.35 and \$3.00, respectively.

For the United States, the monthly rate with board is \$34.38 and without board, \$48.40.
