New Anti-Knock
The German chemical firm, the Badische Anilin hud Soda Fabrik, will, it is said, place on the market in the near future an anti-knocking compound having none of the drawbacks of the lead compounds that have caused such controversy.

This new component which permits of unusual compression in the automobile cylinder, is iron-earbonyi, a compound of iron and carbon monoxide. It is a browl liquid, boiling at 103, degrees C, and soluble in benzole and petrol. Although it is toxic, yet this disadvantage is almost entirely mitigated by the fact that in the atmosphere and daylight it is completely oxidized to ferric loxide and carbon dioxide.

New Test for Concrete
