

CHURCH CHOIRS TO SING AT FARM DAY

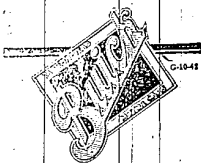

Special cash prizes will be awarded from the R. E. Olds community music fund, grading down from a first award of one hundred dollars.

Entries will be limited to country churches and churches from towns of not more than 500 population insuring a real "country" classification for the interesting contest. The event is being held in line with the plan of the college in developing community singing in the rural districts of the state.

Each choir must consist of at least six singers, and may have as many more than that as desired. Each group will sing two sections, one of which will be a specified religious song.

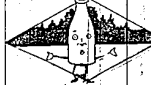

MORE HORSES AT STATE SHOW

That the annual horse show to be staged May 28 and 29 in the Michigan State College football stadium is an ever growing institution is the belief of the turf fans who are following the development of this the third annual event. Besides an unusually large group of local entries and promises of entries from the usual group of Detroit clubs, the entrance of many of the finest saddle horses of Chicago and Toledo has been assured. The most prominent entries of the year are expected to come from the Detroit Riding Club, the Grosse Pointe Hunt, the Bloomfield Oakland Hunt, and owners of fancy horses in Grand Rapids, Jackson, Chicago, and Toledo.

The first to enter his horses for the coming exhibition was Attorney Charles McPherson of Grand Rapids. He has entered two fine geldings in seven jumping classes. Mr. McPherson has made it a practice to ride his own horses on exhibition, and is expected to do the same here.

The annual horse show at Michigan State College was begun in 1924 through the efforts of Col. T. L. Sherburne, head of the R. O. F. C. unit at the college and a regular colonel in the U. S. Cavalry. The exhibit, though

backed by the school, is under the direction of the military department.

Relics of People of Long-Forgotten Age

Recent excavations in a cave site at Creswell Crags, England, have yielded astonishing results. The cave is a passage barely two feet wide, but at a depth of two feet the east wall strikes abruptly backward, giving the lower portion a width of five feet.

Tucked away in a small cavity of the wall was found a huge canine tooth of a bear. It is perfectly preserved, stained dark brown, and when uncovered closely resembled a small banana. It weighs two ounces.

In a crevice between two slabs of rock was the greatest prize of all—a lance point fashioned from the leg bone of a large bird. It is delicately rubbed down and polished to the fineness of a well-sharpened pencil, says a writer in Discover.
