WOULD CUT FARM COSTS

Electricity Will Tend to Decrease Human Labor Charges.

Great opportunities exist for reducing farm operation costs through reduction in labor and better power application, the Department of Agriculture declared.

Only about 19 per cent of the country's land area is suited for crops, the department said, and it has been estimated that perhaps 50 per cent can be utilized when population increases make it necessary.

Much farm work now done by human labor, it added, will be replaced by mechanical power.

Power and labor together account for about 50 per cent of the total cost of farming, the department found, and predicted that a better knowledge of the power requirements and adoption of more efficient types of power would do much to cut production costs.

ELECTRIC FANS ON FARMS

A surprising large number of farm homes use electric fans for keeping the kitchen cool while cooking and other daily work is being done. Fans are also used for drying fruits and vegetables, drying clothes indoors and for similar purposes requiring a strong, direct breeze.
