This was his way of saying that success or failure depend upon the ability to live within one's income.

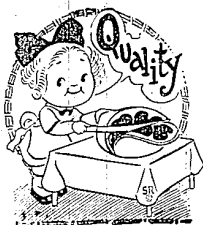

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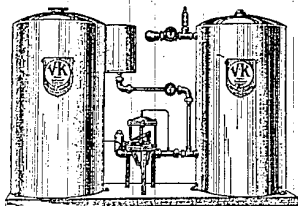

Mr. and Mrs. Guy H. Cook gave a home coming party Sunday in honor of their nephew, Warren

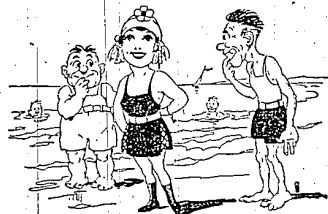

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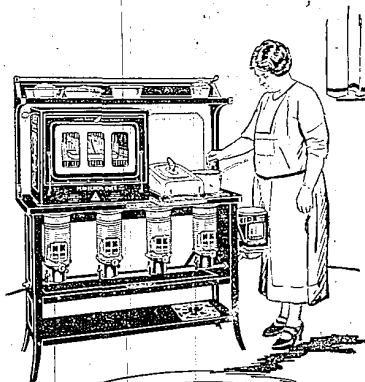
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
