

MOONLIGHT ON THE LAKE

Moonlight dancing excursions on Detroit river and Lake St. Clair, on the big steamer Put In Bay constitute a delightful feature of summer life in the metropolis.

Every evening during the excursion season the young folks gather at the Ashley & Dustin steamer line wharf at the foot of First street and when the steam-

er Put In Bay arrives, from her daily trip across Lake Erie to Put In Bay Island and Sandusky O., at 8 p. m. the gay crowd takes possession of the steamer; the orchestra strikes up a fox trot and the dancers glide onto the polished hardwood floor into the blaze of the ship's lights.

In this automobile age these steamer dancing parties are not monopolized by the young folks of the city for crowds of young people from neighboring cities and villages drive in to enjoy the novel experience of dancing in midlake where the cool breezes blow and the moonlight dances on the waves. The steamer returns to her wharf promptly at 11 p. m., so that out-of-town visitors may reach home at a reasonable hour.

The steamer Put In Bay gives public dancing, moonlight excursions every Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday, at 8:45 p. m., and on the other evenings of the week, except Friday the moonlights are given by clubs and societies but non-members are usually welcome.

SCHOOL DISTRICT No. 5
The annual meeting of School District No. 5 of Farmington Township and City of Farmington was held in the High School auditorium July 12.

Meeting called to order by president of board at 8:00 p. m. Eastern Standard time.

Minutes of last annual meeting were read and on motion approved. Secretary's report for the year 1925-26 was read and on motion by D. L. Dickerson, supported by E. O. Hutton on vote was approved.

Next in order was election of one trustee to succeed Fred L. Cook for the period of three years. On motion the rules were suspended and secretary instructed to cast ballot of meeting for Fred L. Cook to succeed himself. Motion was made by H. M. Warner and supported by D. L. Next following voting on the proposition of bonding the District for the sum of \$30,000 to be used for the purchase of addi-

tional land for school sites. Following was the result of said balloting.

Whole number of votes cast upon the proposition was 50 of which 26 votes were for the resolution and 24 votes were against the resolution.

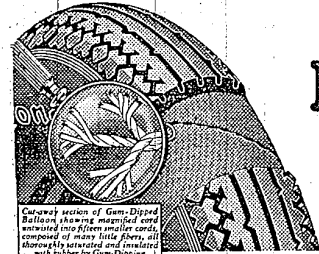
