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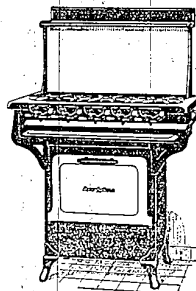

STATE POULTRY ASSN. MEETS AT REDFORD

First annual summer field day of the Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association will be held at the farm of the Larro Milling Company, near Redford on Thursday, August 12.

A general invitation for all Michigan poultrymen to attend is being issued by J. A. Hannal, extension specialist at M. S. C. and secretary of the Improvement Association. A program of general interest to poultry raisers has been prepared, and Mr. Hannal expects a crowd of 500 or more for the gathering.

Among the speakers booked for the program at the field meeting are: E. Hessler, president of the Poultry Improvement Association; Prof. C. G. Card, head of the M. S. C. poultry department; and Prof. H. J. Stafseth, poultry disease specialist who will return August 1 from a year's study of poultry conditions in Europe.

RADIO ON THE FARM

According to estimates, one-fifth of farm homes in United States have radios. Twenty-five per cent of farmers prefer music; 4 per cent make use of weather and market reports. Forty-one per cent of farm women prefer home-makers programs; 31 per cent, musical programs; eight per cent, lectures; three per cent, church services; one per cent, garden and poultry talks. Ninety-five per cent of farmers consider their radio a utility as well as an amusement device, according to a recent survey, as radio brings them market reports 24 to 48 hours earlier than obtainable by other means.

JUDGE TUTTLE FLAYS ENFORCEMENT METHODS

When such men as Federal Judge Tuttle feel called upon to say from the bench the methods of government officials in the enforcement of the prohibitory laws, it is time for the people to wake up to the present situation. "It is well known, not only to the bootleggers but to everyone else, that the government has made only a half-hearted effort to stop the bringing of liquor from Canada to Detroit. The government has done practically nothing along this line since the Volstead law was enacted except to announce from Washington what was going to be done," Judge Tuttle said.

"The boats in use for the river patrol are too slow and too few. The little which is done in the way of patrolling the border is broadcast from Washington to the bootleggers long before it is done. Washington publishes how many boats are being built and how fast they will run. Most of it never is done, and long before the little is done the bootlegger has built still faster boats.

"The methods employed are childish and ridiculous. This is known not only to the bootleggers, but is apparent to everyone. It is necessary for this court to take cognizance of this situation "Ecorse, down the river, west

of Detroit, is the immediate place from which this liquor in question came. At the time of the arrest in this case Ecorse, was the recognized market in this county for Canadian beer and whiskey.

"Washington has now assigned a few men to watch for liquor runners around Ecorse, and the runners simply have shifted their bases of operations to the St. Clair river and Lake St. Clair. Twenty-five men cannot patrol 90 miles of border and stop liquor smuggling.

"Washington makes itself silly and ridiculous in the eyes of the people of Michigan through the way it passes laws to please people with dry views and then fails to enforce those laws in order to please people with wet views."

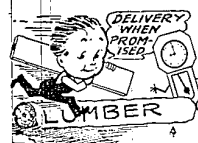
