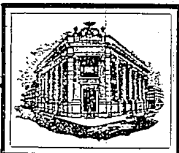

**UNDERWOOD SEEKS
2nd TERM AS PROSECUTOR**

Mr. Underwood was born and reared in the City of Pontiac. His education was obtained in the Pontiac schools and he graduated from the Detroit College of Law. He was admitted to the Oakland County Bar Association in 1919 and opened an office for the practice of law. After two years he was selected by A. Floyd Blakeslee as his first assistant in the prosecutor's office and assisted



ed Mr. Blakeslee during his four year term. Two years ago Mr. Underwood was elected prosecutor and has served in that capacity in the past 18 months.

"No prosecutor who has held the position in the past has been called upon to prosecute more major crimes," said Mr. Underwood today. "During the year and a half I have served there have been 4,193 prosecutions made by my office. This is a record for the length of time. "With the growth of the county the criminal business is on the increase and the office of prosecutor has become an important one. The major crimes have become so numerous that my time is largely taken up with the trial of cases in Circuit Court. Complaints made at the office take up a great deal of the attention of the prosecutor and two assistants."

Mr. Underwood is unmarried and is a member of the Elks, Masonic, Knights of Pythias, and Caribou Lodges. He attends the All Saints Episcopal Church.
