PLAN QUALITY SHOW FOR THE STATE FAIR

A story of quality production and better farming in general will be told by agricultural departments of the Michigan State College in a big educational exhibit at the State Fair next month.

The college exhibit, which will be housed in the new Agricultural building on the Fair grounds, is being built around the general theme of "quality" in all agricultural practices. The idea that it is not more crops so much as better crops and more efficient production methods that are needed will be brought out.

More than 100 feet of wall space in the Agricultural building will be given over to the college show, which will consist of a series of individual display booths. Thousands have been built so as to bring out the stories to be told in the most effective way.

Nine different departments of the M. S. C. agricultural division are to have "booths," each making up a separate exhibit, except that all will be tied together by the central theme of quality. Farm crops, soils, horticulture, home economics, dairy, animal husbandry, poultry, marketing, and agricultural engineering will be included.

Live chicks, just from the in-

cubator, will form an active center for the poultry section, while pictures and other features will add interest to the other groups.

POTATO GROWERS TO TOUR OAKLAND COUNTY

A potato tour for the northern counties of the lower peninsula through the heart of the certified seed district will be conducted August 24 and 25 under the auspices of the Michigan Potato Producers Association, according to H. C. Moore, extension special-

list at M. S. C. Arrangements are being made for growers from the southern counties to attend the northern tour.

There will also be a potato tour in Oakland county August 26 and 27, in which the Oakland county Farm Bureau, Boys' and Girls' Potato Clubs, and the Kiwanis Club of Pontiac will participate. A special feature of this tour will be a visit to the Percy King farm where nearly 200 sources of strains of seed potatoes are under observation.

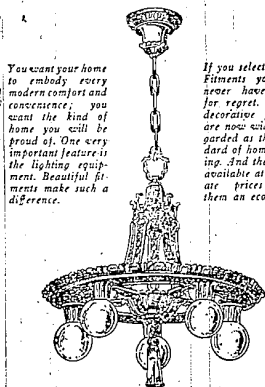
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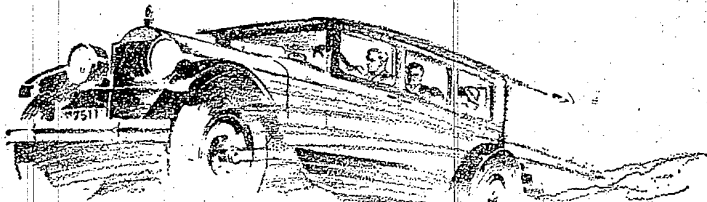
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
