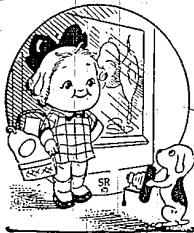
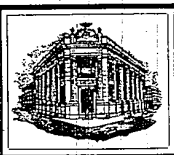

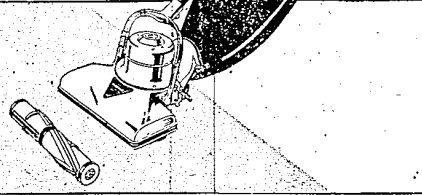

ANOTHER INTERESTING LETTER FROM MRS. WOLFE

Portland, Oregon.

August 10, 1926

To Mrs. Miller and other Friends: We are enjoying fine weather in Oregon, where we have been stopping for a few days.

Portland is a beautiful city. Some of the buildings are immense and are a credit to the westerners. There are good paved roads winding around big boulders.

When in Long View we went through the largest sawmill in the west. The buildings cover 80 acres and it took us two hours to go through. We watched a most interesting process of changing large logs from 20 to 50 feet in circumference to the finest of fine boards. This factory cuts daily, one million feet of lumber and employs thousands of men.

In looking over the situation in west, it will be a serious time when the timber is done, for that is the principle industry at the present time. A great amount of the level land is in an uncultivated state.

The most enjoyable part of our trip was spent at the Pacific ocean. I had the pleasure of taking several dips. The breakers roared and the foamy billows would seem to almost cover us. With me were Mrs. Fred Bond and two daughters, Lillian and Ruth. Mrs. Bond and I expect to start on Monday for San Francisco and will be glad to see Michigan the last of this month. Hope to find all well.
