

### British Teachers to Study American Ideas

An additional scholarship for educational research in America, available to teachers in Great Britain and Ireland, has been established in connection with the research work of the city of London vacation course. The new Bush vacation course has a value of \$300 (\$1,500), and the appointee, who may be a man or woman, will be sent out this fall or early in 1927. Appointment will be made by an advisory board consisting of the president of the course and other educational officials. Candidates must submit a statement of the research proposed and method to be pursued. The appointee will be required to send monthly reports of progress made, and upon completion of the work present a thesis embodying results of the study.

Two scholars have already visited America under similar appointment by the city of London vacation course. Miss Mabel J. Wellock made a tour of the country in 1925 studying elementary education, and Mr. Arthur B. Neal is now investigating junior high schools and rural education.—School Life.

### Spooks Drive Keepers

From Alaskan Island  
Two caretakers of a blue fox farm on Chirikoff island, 80 miles west of Kodiak, Alaska, are ready to resign because of spooks.  
The island was once a Russian penal colony and many graves are marked with crosses. The caretakers claim that during the past winter the cross on an unknown grave moved from one end to the other, spooks whistle down their cabin chimneys and queer voices spoke on occasions.

Three hundred head of wild cattle, with a curious kind of furlike hair, share the island with the blue foxes. They thrive on luxuriant grass. It is necessary to carry a gun when distant from the settle-

ment as a precaution against attack from the loughorns.

### Potato's Food Value

The potato is an important source of vitamin B—the anti-neuritic vitamin, whose lack causes the disease known as beri-beri, according to F. J. Lyman and Ines Blystone of the laboratory of applied chemistry at Ohio university, who says this essential element is distributed about uniformly throughout the potato and is stable both during cooking and storage. Mr. Lyman and Miss Blystone have conducted a series of experiments in which they have found that rats thrived and grew at a normal rate on a diet containing as much as 80 per cent potatoes. When put on a diet of only 40 per cent potatoes from which other foods containing vitamin B were excluded, the rats showed a rapid decline in condition which disappeared as soon as a sufficient quantity of vitamin B was again supplied.

### Humane Beaver Trap

A patent has been granted on a beaver trap invented by Vernon Bailey, of the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture, for capturing beavers alive for propagation and restocking purposes. The trap is not designed for taking these animals for their fur. The patent dedicates this improvement in animal traps to the people of the United States and permits its manufacture by anyone for private or commercial purposes.

### Big Fellow Worsted

The usual order of things was reversed when a bicycle, crashing in to an automobile truck at Providence, R. I., came out of the accident unscathed, while the truck limped away from the scene with a ruined tire. The force of the collision caused a tire on the truck to blow out, while the bicycle and its rider were not scratched.

### County Hospitals

Do most states in the Union have at least one hospital in every county? Reports for 1925 show Connecticut, Maine and New Hampshire were the only states that did have at least one hospital for community use in every county. About 10 per cent of the New York counties were without such hospitals. The worst record was shown by Georgia, almost 70 per cent of the counties being without ordinary hospitals.

For General Primary Election

To the qualified electors of the township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan:

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law," I, the undersigned Township Clerk, will upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special election, or primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Township not already registered who may apply to me personally for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the second Saturday before any regular, special, or official primary election and the day of such election.

The last day for General Registration does not apply to persons who vote under the Absent Voters' Law (See Registration by Affidavit).

Note—If this acknowledgement is taken outside of the State, the Certificate of the Court that the person taking the acknowledgement is a notary must be attached.

Registration of Absentee by Oath

Sec. 9. If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election or primary election, and shall, under oath, state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the Township Twenty Days next preceding such election or primary election, designating particularly the place of his or her residence and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself or some member of his or her family, or owing to his or her absence from the Township on public business or his or her own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election or primary election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he or she shall then be permitted to vote at such election or primary election.

If such applicant shall in said matter, wilfully make any false statement, he or she shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

Provision in Case of Removal to Another Precinct


Sec. 11. Any registered and qualified voter who has removed from One Election Precinct to a Township to another election precinct of the same Township shall have the right, on any day previous to election, or primary election day, on application to Township Clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she has removed to the registration book of the precinct in which he or she then resides. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on any Election, or Primary Election day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of such election or primary election of the precinct from which he or she has removed a certificate of transfer and presenting the said certificate to the Board of Election Inspectors of the Precinct in which he or she then resides.
