DETROIT AMAZED BY WONDER-THATRE

Detroit is marvelling at the buying power today of the dollar in the theatre world. The new Michigan Theatre, operated by John H. Kunsky and Balaban & Katz, which represents an investment of \$6,000,000 and is a combination of art-museum, symphony hall, and wonder-theatre startled the city by instituting a price policy of such small size as to be unbelievable. The answer of course, is in the volume of business attracted to the 5,000 seats which are filled at each of the five daily de luxe performances. The shows consist of a 50-piece symphony concert, organ solo on the world's most expensive pipe organ, first pick of the best screen dramas and screen specialties, and at least two stage productions. Famous personalities are used in the latter, and the personnel of each frequently is as large as fifty artists, singers, and dancers.

Among the stage events scheduled immediately are George Beban and his company of 25 players, enacting part of the screen drama on the stage; Paul Whitman and his whole orchestra; Gilda Grey, and a company of 25 dancers, with her picture "Aloma of the South Seas"; and Eddie Cantor, in person with his "Kid Boots" company, in conjunction with the picture of that title.

TO THE VOTERS OF FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP

A recent opinion from the Attorney General to the Township Board, informed us that we could no longer hold town meetings or elections in the Town Hall in the City of Farmington. This opinion came so late that it has been necessary to find a suitable place for elections satisfactory to all voters, in a very limited time.

At a joint meeting of the Township Committee and the Township Board on Tuesday evening, August 24, several places for holding elections were considered. There were several places near Farmington Junction offered, but that was within the territory of the second precinct. School houses cannot be used because school will be in session. Vacant houses which were available were without lights. It was then suggested that we accept the offer of the free use of the Glenoaks Golf Club house on the 13-Mile road near Orchard Lake road. The opinion that we use this place for the primary election was unanimous, even though some of the voters will have to travel four or five miles. By the time of the next election it is hoped that there will be a more centrally located place to hold the election for the first precinct.

CONGRESSIONAL—One candidate in Congress for the Congressional district of which said Township forms a part.

LEGISLATIVE—One candidate for Senator in the State Legislature for the Senatorial District of which said Township forms a part; one candidate for Representative in the State Legislature for the Legislative district of which said Township forms a part.

COUNTY—Also candidates for the following county offices viz.: Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Prosecuting Attorney; two Circuit Court Commissioners; one County Drain Commissioner; two Coroners; one County Road Commissioner.

DELEGATES TO COUNTY CONVENTIONS

There shall also be elected at said primary, by direct vote of the registered and qualified voters of each political party in each county, as many delegates in each township, ward or precinct, as that township, ward or precinct may be, as such political party in such township, ward or precinct shall be entitled to by the call issued by the county committee of such political party for the county convention thereafter to be held by such political party within said county in that year for the purpose of electing delegates to the state convention called for the purpose of nominating candidates for state offices, to be voted for at the November election. In case of any vacancy in any delegation from any election precinct, township or ward to the county convention, such

vacancy shall be filled by the delegates present from the ward or township, in which the vacancy occurs.

The state central committee of each political party shall, at least thirty days before the September primary herein provided for, cause to be forwarded by mail to the chairman of the county committee of such party a copy of the call for the Fall state convention showing the number of delegates to which such county shall be entitled in the state convention of such party; and the said state central committee shall apportion such delegates to the several counties in proportion and according to the number of votes cast for the candidate of such party for secretary of state in each of said counties, respectively, at the last preceding November election.

The name of the candidate for delegate to the county convention shall not be printed upon the official primary election ballot, but one or more such names may be placed on such ballot by printed or written slips pasted thereon by the voter, or the names may be written in by the voter.

Delegates to the Fall county convention shall be elected by election precincts and the county clerk shall notify by mail each person elected as such delegate.

The required number of electors to receive the highest number of votes for delegates to the Fall county convention of any political party shall be declared by the board of primary election inspectors to be elected.

The board of primary election inspectors shall certify to the county clerk the names of the electors so elected, as delegates naming the political party upon whose ballots such electors were elected. The county clerk shall notify each delegate so elected of his election as such delegate, and shall certify to the chairman of the county committee of each political party of the county, the delegates elected by such political party as delegates to the Fall county convention.

SUGGESTIONS RELATIVE TO VOTING

SEPARATE BALLOTS for each political party will be provided. The elector must name the political party of his choice when asking for a ballot and in marking his ballot must make a cross in the square to the left of the name of each candidate for whom he desires to vote, and can vote for only one candidate except where two or more candidates are to be nominated in which case he should vote for two or the number to be nominated.

NOTICE RELATIVE TO OPENING AND CLOSING OF THE POLLS

Act 351—Part IV—Chapter VIII, Public Acts of 1925

Sec. 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and shall be continued open until five o'clock in the afternoon and no longer; PROVIDED, That in townships the board of inspectors of election may, in its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and that the township board in townships and the legislative body in cities and villages may, by resolution adopt

ed fifteen days prior to the election and published with the notice of the election, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day.

By resolution by the Farmington Township Board, the polls of said election will be open at 7:00 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until 8:00 o'clock p. m., of said day of election, unless the Board of Election Inspectors shall in their discretion, adjourn the polls at 12:00 o'clock, noon, for one hour.
