### Believe Royal Miser

#### Left Hidden Wealth

Nabo Tsibendi, the late queen-mother of Swaziland, was a woman of great force of character, and for something like thirty years played a leading part in tribal affairs, says Cleveland Plain Dealer.

As head wife of Mbandini in the days when the paramount chief wielded the full powers of a native autocrat, she took over the government on his death in 1889 and exercised her authority to its utmost limits. She was supplanted a few years ago by the mother of Sobhuza, and had been living in retirement and failing health.

Amongst the natives she was generally reputed to be of great wealth, for when Mbandini died she took over \$40,000 in the royal safe, and from 1894 to 1900 an annuity of \$60,000 was paid in monthly installments of \$5,000.

There was no evidence of any expenditure on her part. On the contrary, she invariably pleaded poverty, and the story goes that she and her daughter (who predeceased her) were the only persons who knew the whereabouts of her accumulated wealth. Whether it exists and whether the secret of its hiding place died with her will probably remain a mystery, and one that may excite hidden treasure hunters of a future generation.
