STATE-COUNTY ELECTIONS

In the state the election proved a landslide for Fred W. Green of Ionia over Governor Groesbeck, his majority crowding 150,000. For lieutenant governor Dickenson appears to have defeated Lieut. Gov. Welsh. Hudson is nominated for congressional representative over Pengelly by a safe majority.

The election throughout the county was a spirited one owing to the big fight for the gubernatorial nomination and several contests for local offices.

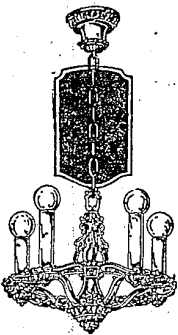
