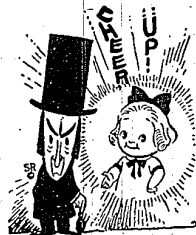

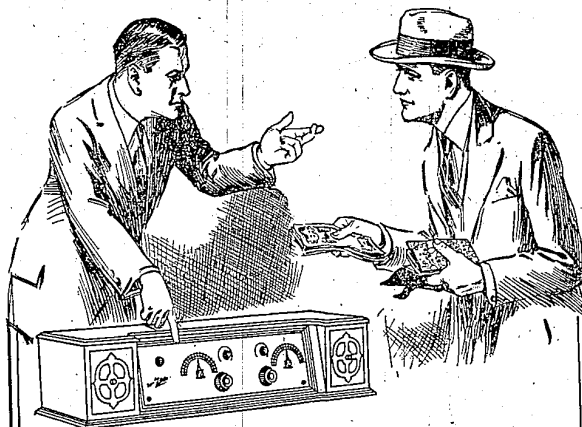

Since the annual clean-up last May, Farmington has gradually lowered its standard of cleanliness—peanut shells, tobacco expectorations, paper and rubbish are quite familiar features of the landscape in many parts of the city. A little more attention and care would improve the appearance of our streets and sidewalks and change the periodical get clean week to a keep clean year.

It would indicate thrift and lessen the cost of the May municipal face washing, which though but a moderate expenditure should be thought of in a community that demands low taxes. Let us try to help the householders who have already filled old boxes, barrels or other receptacles with empty bottles, tin cans and similar by-products. The Department of Public Works has established a temporary dumping ground on the north side of the Fendt road, some rods east of Powers avenue. The rubbish thrown there should be kept in a compact heap so that the department may keep it covered without unnecessary labor.

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
