SAVE OUR FORESTS

If the disastrous fires which have swept the forests of Michigan in past years are not sufficient to convince hunters and campers of the necessity and importance of the utmost care in the use of fire in the woods, then the heedless ones should be dealt with severely even though a campaign of prosecution costs the state a round sum of money. Every fisherman, hunter or camper convicted of carelessness in this regard should, in addition to a stiff fine, be deprived of privileges to all reserves and state lands for a certain period of time.

Statistics show that a large number of forest fires are the result of carelessness or deliberate disregard of all rules of safety. The big hunting season will open in a few weeks and thousands of hunters from every section of the country will flock to Northern Michigan. Thousands of camp fires will be lighted and many thousands of half burned matches will be tossed into the dry underbrush. A campfire properly extinguished before leaving it, and a dead match thrown by the wayside will do no harm. A little care will save much.

The Michigan Press Association is doing a good work in its campaign of conservation of our forests. Its efforts should be backed by a strenuous campaign of prosecution against those who do not heed the warnings given.

FARMERS WILL JUDGE

CATTLE AT NATIONAL  
Fifteen states and Canadian provinces are sending teams to the third annual farmers' judging contest at Detroit, October 6 to 13, in connection with the National Dairy Exposition, according to George Gierbach and J. G. Wells, Dairy Extension Specialists, Michigan State College, in charge of the contest.

Professionals are barred from this event at the Exposition. Any man or woman who has never acted as a judge at a fair or show, or served as college instructor, agricultural agent, teacher, or represented a college at an inter-state or national contest, is eligible. In other words entrants must be strictly amateurs. Awards are made for each breed to both teams and individuals.

Over a hundred farmers from thirteen states took part in last year's contest. This educational event is of great value in improving the selection and development of the proper types of dairy cattle.

The Mayor appointed Hogle and Johnson a committee to consider the real estate plan offered by F. D. Fleming and report at next meeting.

Traffic Ordinance C-3-26 passed its first reading.

The Mayor appointed Russell Cook and Gildemeister a committee on Street Signs and House numbering.

Motion made by Hogle seconded by Russell that we buy five coils of lead pipe. Carried.  
The Supt. of Public Works was instructed to notify the Good Oil Station that they must restore the Street curb that they tore down and put it in proper shape.
