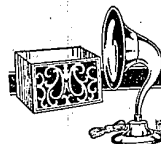

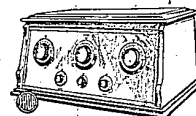
## OLD HOME TOWN IS NOT FORGOTTEN
