TO THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON:

NOTICE is hereby given that a special City election will be held at Farmington Town Hall, in said City, upon the 16th day of November 1926, at which there will be submitted to the vote of the electors of the City, the question of ratifying a certain public utility franchise contained in an ordinance adopted by the City Commission at its meeting held upon the 4th day of October, 1926 which said ordinance is entitled as follows:

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right and authority to acquire, lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the streets, avenues, alleys and other public places, and to do a local business in the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

On the date of said election, the polls will be open at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and will be kept open until 8 o'clock P. M., when they will be finally closed.

The City Clerk will be in his office upon the 23rd day of October, 1926, and the 30th day of October, 1926, said dates being the third and fourth Saturdays, respectively, preceding the date of such election, for the purpose of reviewing the registration and registering such of the qualified electors as shall appear and apply therefor, which registration may be made upon said dates between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 8:00 P. M.
