

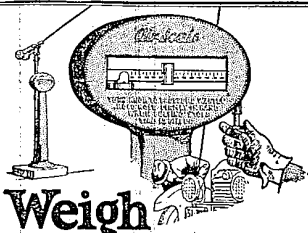

Old Hunter Recalls

Day of Buffalo Hunt

Dr. George Bird Grinnell of New York, after whom the Indians named Grinnell glacier in Glacier National park, is one of a few white men still living who actually hunted buffalo with American Indians. On a recent visit to Glacier park Doctor Grinnell found only about half a dozen of the older Indians who hunted with him fifty years ago.

"The Indians in those days made two buffalo hunts a year, and it was one of their fall hunts when they went forth for winter supplies that I accompanied a large band of Blackfeet," said Doctor Grinnell.

"There were 800 braves in the party, riding over the prairies of the Two Medicine in a wide line. The women followed with pack horses and tepees. Except for rifles carried by three white men, there were no weapons other than bows and arrows.

"We presently topped a rise and sighted a large herd of buffalo, whereupon the hunters threw the ends of their line forward and engaged in a circling movement, which enveloped the herd. The hunters were then free to attack singly, and within an hour they had killed approximately 1,000 buffalo. Soon afterward the women came up and the party went into camp to skin the buffalo and smoke the meat. Unlike the white man, the Indians conserved the buffalo for his own uses. He made clothes and shelter of the skins, and the buffalo meat was his principal food."

"Big Business" Keeps Old Men for Council

If you are forty-five or fifty or even sixty and haven't reached the top, don't despair. The average age of the General Electric directors is over sixty. C. A. Coffin, the venerable upbuilder of this unique enterprise, is eighty-two. The age of the American Telephone and Telegraph directors averages, curiously enough, exactly the same, a trifle over sixty. The range here is greater than in any of our other colossal industrial corporations. George F. Baker leads the directors, in point of age, with eighty-six years to his credit, while W. S. Gifford, president and director, is only forty-one. The United States steel directors average still older than those of these other two companies, sixty-three and one-half. Mr. Baker also heads this board, followed by Chairman E. H. Gary, who has just entered his eightieth year. The youngest member is the son of the oldest, George F. Baker, Jr., forty-eight. The members of the finance committee average more than sixty-five years. No member is as young as fifty.—B. C. Forbes, in Forbes Magazine.
