AMATEUR JUDGES WIN HONORS

Students of Michigan State College won many honors at the National Dairy Show held in Detroit. Harold J. Foster, Rives Junction, won first place in the student Holstein judging contest and Theodore Knopf, Blissfield, placed second. The M. S. C. team won first over teams from 26 colleges competing in this event. Gordon Whitburn, Marenisco, was the third member of the Michigan State team.

The team was coached by John Burnett, associate professor of dairy husbandry. A scholarship \$400 was one of the prizes won by Mr. Foster.

A great deal of competition developed in the farmers judging contests held at the same show. Delos Parrish, Fairgrove, won first on Jersey judging; C. S. Baldwin, Bennington, first for Holsteins; and H. G. Tyrrell, Detroit, first for Guernseys. These men were all members of a cow testing association in their community.
