Illustration, Paris. Owing to the absence of atmosphere, the distances would be visually shortened, the sky would be bluck and the shadows very dark, though reflected light, especially from the earth, would be intense. Idealistic views frequently show a lunar landscape as a surface twisted and bored with crater-form excarations, as if torn by a bombardment of high-explosive shells, and dominated by peaks. All this beneath a glaring light, with a perfectly black sky overhead in which stars sparkle despite the presence of the sun during the lunar day.
