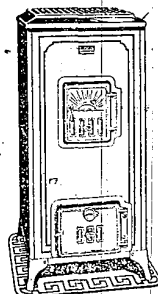

"You're an angel," he said ardently.

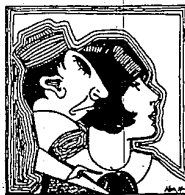
"No, no, you are wrong," said she. "I am vain, selfish, idle, extravagant, utterly unfit to be your helpmate through life."
