MUCH INTEREST IN LOCATION OF P. M.'S NEW MAIN TRACK

Pere Marquette President Declines To Disclose Railroad's Plans

There is considerable conjecture in this section as to the probable location of the Pere Marquette tracks, which will run from near Wixom to Pontiac. In discussing the matter, Frank H. Alfred, president of the road, is quoted to the effect that plans for the location of the main line are not fully developed and even if were, it would be impractical under the existing competition which exists between the Pere Marquette and Grand Trunk, to disclose the manner in which the connection will be made.

Probabilities are that an effort will be made to use the Grand Trunk tracks from Wixom to within a short distance of Pontiac, but this is unconfirmed.

A study of the map would indicate the most plausible route as leaving the present Pere Marquette line south of Wixom, if separate tracks are to be built.

C. T. Wants Line

The Grand Trunk has filed a petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission for a right to build a belt line paralleling the Pere Marquette belt in Pontiac.

Mr. Alfred stated that the Pere Marquette railway is ready and willing to negotiate with the Grand Trunk with a view to reaching an arrangement on fair terms, whereby both railroads can work in friendly competition and be in a position to exchange facilities.

No further action will be taken until after the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission on the Grand Trunk petition.
