ODDFELLOWS DEDICATE

**NEW TEMPLE; REBEKAHS
GIVE MEMORIAL SERVICE**

The dedication of Fellowship Temple and memorial service of Clarenceville I. O. O. F., No. 427, took place at 3:30 Sunday, June 12th.

The dedication address was given by Homer Carr, a grand lodge officer. The memorial sermon was preached by the Rev. George Gullen. The Rev. Wallis opened the service with prayer.

The singer for the occasion was Paul Behnke of Redford and Mr. Hathaway of Brightmoor. Willis T. Roberts also gave a speech. The Rebekah memorial service was given by a picked staff and was very beautiful.

The new hall erected in such a short time is very comfortable and shows a great spirit of co-

operation and loyalty among the members.

The front portion of the building is two stories high and includes a regalia room, a lounge and reception room, and a space for the fireproof projection booth in which motion picture apparatus is to be installed. On the ground floor there are in addition to the auditorium a fully equipped kitchen, a check room and a small office. Plans call for the beautifying of the grounds and the establishing of a cinderized wire-enclosed parking space illuminated with flood lights, and capable of holding approximately 75 automobiles.

The present officers of the lodge are: Noble Grand, Herbert Dusha; acting N. G., Norman Cook; past grand, Will Lindermeyer; Chaplain, Chauncey Price; financial secretary, Willis T. Roberts, and recording secretary, Archibald Rolfe. The financing of the new temple building was in the hands of a committee consisting of Willis Roberts, William Fox,

Norman Cook, George March, and Don Parks who also served as director in charge of construction. The work of building the temple was begun early in May.

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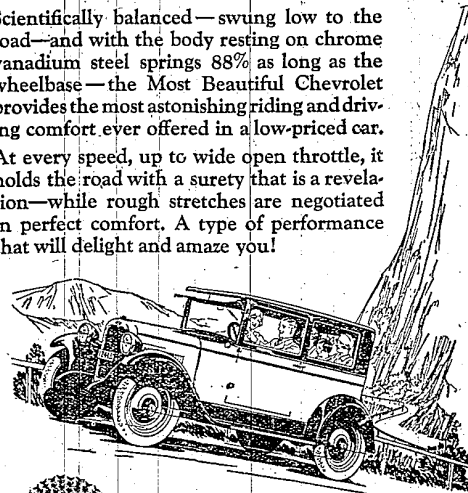
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
