"MY APPOINTMENT was at 5 a.m.," she said. "He goes until 7 at might." She praised his "wonderful diagnostic equipment." and his skills, saying, "He teaches you with exercises and diet control." She regrets that she did not remain under his care but said it would have been difficult unless she stayed in Louisiana. "I was desperate," she said, explaining, that she opied in-seid for surgery. Jim Sweeney of Bloomfield Hills, who is reliefue, has a vestibular disorder, "an imbalance of fluids or pressure, which lead to vertigo. It can be incapacitating," he said. Sweeney's first attack came when he was taking a medication for another health problem. He stopped taking the medication but still found him-self subject to vertigo attacks. "For 12 years I went to doctors without the proper diagnosis," he said.

Sweeney read in the newspaper about the support group for Menicre's and vertigo disorders." It have been able through diet and fluid intake and avoidance of medications, to control the condition, he said. He attributes a lot of his knowledge to talking with other support group members and the guest speakers.

"I'm no longer on my own," he said; grateful for the support the group has given him. Dr. Dennis I. Bojrab, otslogist at Wm. Beaumont Hospital, "has talked a number of times. I've learned a great deal from him." Bojrab also will be on the program at this month's meetling, with Dr. Rubin.

ANOTHER RESIDENT of Bloom-field Hills who has Meniere's asked not to have her name used in the newspaper. 'It's a private thing,' she said. 'Then my friends will know.'' Many people with Meniere's do not want anyone to know about their disease, fearing job loss or other potential problems. This woman, a widow who is now 78, said she first had her dizzy spells

at 18. "They called it Meniere's Syndrome when I IIrst had it. It went away but I kept enough hearing to raise my children." She has lost hearing in one ear and, "The other ear is down to not very much. I wear two hearing aids," she said.

Dorothy Rivard of Birmingham said her dizziness disorder has been diagnosed as microvascular vestibular nerve decompression caused when "a swillen blood vessel presses on the balance nerve." She said she began having problems in mid-1988

but wasn't diagnosed until late October 1990.

A widow, who does volunteer
work, she said her occasional
"abrupt diszlinest" doesn't keep her
from functioning. But, "it's sort of
makes you fearful. You don't know
when it's going to reappear."

Support group founder Marie Key,
who said Menter's is incurable,
stresses the importance of early diagnosis. "It's not life threatening,
but it is lifestyle threatening," she
said of the disease.
