**Skilled musician rises to challenge**

Sunday I attended two events of the Jewish community that took place within one hour of each other.

The first, starting at 3 p.m. at the Jewish Community Center in West Bloomfield, was the first of this season's Julius Chajes Music Fund Concert series. It featured the Israeli-born pianist Rina Dokshinsky.

The other event, in the evening, took place at Temple Israel. The event, which was free to the public, was the first of the series, "Jewish Music from Many Lands," emphasizing Israeli music.

The performing artists consisted of pianist Fedora Horowitz, DSO flutist Shaul Ben Meir and clarinet player Eli Eban, who is on the music faculty of the University of Indiana. All three are Israeli artists who live in this country.

DOKSHINSKY—HAS—won—many awards, and has appeared in this area a few years ago in the Annual Artist Series, an event taking place annually at Orchestra Hall.

Sunday she presented a challenging program consisting of works by

Mozart, Chopin, Beethoven and Chajes. Since the last time I heard her she has matured technically and artistically.

She coped impressively with the two big sonatas in the program — the B minor by Chopin and the C minor, Op. 111, by Beethoven.

One factor that detracted from the quality of this performance was the poor tone quality of the piano. This was especially noticeable in the upper range, where some of the most inspired variations of Beethoven's last-sonata take-place. But much of Dokshinsky's capable style came through in spite of this impediment. The program concluded with a suite of vivacious arrangements by Chajes of Israeli melodies. As an encore she played a selection from

Tchaikovsky's Seasons. There are many pianists with credible technical skills. But it is my impression that Dokshinsky has her own musical statement to offer, and we may be hearing of her more in the future.

THE SUBTITLE of the event at Temple Israel was "From Israel — with Love." This, to some degree, was misleading. Two of the works on this program were by composers of international reputation.

These consisted of the Sonata for Clarinet and Piano by Poulenc and a Concertino for Flute, Clarinet and Piano by Bloch, whose claim to fame is primarily through his Hebraic rhapsody for cello.

The Israeli portion of that program consisted of three songs without words by Paul Ben-Haim and a

suite for Clarinet and Piano on Jewish dances and chants by Shlomo Irving Glick.

Ben Haim was a leading Israeli composer who died about two years ago. He was a household name in Israel but he is little known outside.

The event attracted more people than could be accommodated by the small Schimler Chapel, and seating overflowed into the adjacent entrance hall. None of the works performed is in the standard repertoire, but Poulenc's Sonata for Clarinet and Piano has some striking similarities to his sonata for Flute and Piano, which is far better known.

BOTH OF these events were attended by many who are not regularly exposed to classical music events, which resulted in frequent applause between movements.

Maybe the composers should have heeded the solution that Mendelssohn provided in his Violin Concerto, by sustaining a note between the first and second movements.
