

## Falcons, Harrison win duals

It was the Western Lakes Activities Association against the Southeastern Michigan Association in girls swimming Tuesday, and the WLAA was a big winner as Farmington and Harrison scored one-sided victories.

The Falcons achieved their first dual-meet win with a 120-66 defeat of host Ferndale, and the visiting Hawks routed Berkley 109-76.

Farmington (1-3) won all but one event, and Jill Hawkins and Becky Weary were the leaders with four first places apiece.

Hawkins won the 50-yard freestyle (27.08) and 100 freestyle (59.29). Weary, the individual medley (2:29.37) and butterfly (1:07.63). They also combined with Maureen Gerwatowski and Jill Benivenga to win the medley relay (4:07.53). Emily Ousij anchored the winning 200 freestyle relay (1:54.03), which included Hawkins, Weary and Benivenga.

KIM SEED was a double winner by individual events. She was first in the 200 freestyle (2:13.33) and 500 freestyle (5:48.05). Emily and Amy Otusij, Seed and Lisa Mitchell comprised the winning 400 freestyle relay team (4:18.51).

The Gerwatowski had three wins, Maureen adding first in the breaststroke (1:18.13) and Nicole Gerwatowski finishing first in diving with 188.95 points.

"The girls all swam very well and pulled together to get our first victory of the season," Farmington coach Lisa Collins said. "The next few weeks will tell how we're doing. We can look forward to dual meets instead of practices."

Stacey Krause had two individual wins for Harrison (2-4) in the butterfly (1:09.89) and the breaststroke (1:14.77), and she also helped the Hawks win two relays.

Wendy Leland, Lisa Schaner, Cassie O'Sullivan and Krause had a time of 4:57.98 in the medley relay. Jenny Duffino, Veronica Forberger, Dana Dixon and Krause finished the 400 freestyle relay in 4:03.

Domino also had a pair of solo wins in the IM (2:30.59) and 500 freestyle (5:41.35). Elalao Trager won the diving competition with 247.35 points.

## Ladywood avenges loss to Mercy

Farmington Hills Mercy settled for a split in its basketball series with rival Livonia Ladywood when the Marlins lost the rematch 53-51 Tuesday at Redford Catholic Central.

Mercy, which toppled Birmingham Marian 45-43 last week, slipped to 3-2 in the Central Division of the Catholic League and 6-4 overall. The Blazers are 2-3 and 8-5.

The Marlins led 22-22 at halftime and 34-32 at the end of three quarters but were outscored by Ladywood in the last period 21-17.

Mary Jo Kelly scored 18 points and Tracy Prybylski 13 to lead the Blazers. Allison Brenny came off the bench to score nine of her 10 points in the fourth quarter, and Tara Wasiak added nine.

Kelly and Prybylski combined to make seven of nine free throws in the finale, too. Ladywood was 13-of-21 at the line, the Marlins 7-of-12.

The game was tied at 44 when the fourth quarter ended. Cathy Mruk, who didn't play until the overtime period, hit a three-point basket with 30 left to give the Rockets a 50-46 lead.

"We were close, we had our chances," Harrison coach Pete Martyla said. "We're playing good basketball. We need to get over the hump."

Freshman Krista Snow had a big game for Harrison (8-8 in the Western Lakes Activities Association and 3-9 overall) with 20 points and 16 rebounds. Heather Hopkins had 16 points and 13 rebounds. Katie McCaslin added eight points.

## Harrison denied spot in 'B' finals

"range," he said. "We're not in the top 10, but I expect to be at least around there. If we have a decent draw and continue to play good tennis, we can do well."

"I'll be encouraging (his players) to win their first-round matches. If you can do that, it gives you a basis to build on. If they play their best tennis and get beat, that's fine. But I would hate to see them not play the type of tennis they're capable of, because they would be disappointed by that, and so would the fans."

Livonia Stevenson ran away with the championship of the Waterford Mott regional with 23 points, but North and Novi tied for second place with 13. Walpole Central, Northville and West Bloomfield were within three points.

"There was no doubt I expected Stevenson to win it, but I thought we had a real good chance to finish second," North coach Norm Staszewski said. "It doesn't always work out that conveniently. You can lose a round here or there, and you start struggling for points later in the tournament."

"I hoped everybody would get to the semis. If that had happened, it would have put us in a comfortable position, but it didn't work out that way."

The Raiders had a pair of second-place finishes from Keely Jones at No. 2 singles and the No. 1 doubles team of Hadley Thurmon and Jana Bockrath. WLCS's Rachel Clanton won the second singles title, and Stevenson won a three-set match in second doubles. Jones has a 15-4 record, Thurmon and Bockrath 16-2.

NORTH'S NO. 1 singles player (Jennifer Redf), No. 2 doubles team (Sharon Reiter-Alison Walkon) and No. 3 doubles combination (Margi Liffey-Renee Choi) won two matches each and got to the semifinals.

Jennifer Kristall won her first-round match at No. 4 singles, and Heather Stoneman lost a three-setter in the opening round at No. 3 singles.

The Raiders are going to state for the third time in five years, having qualified in 1987 and 1988, also.

"I tell the kids just getting there is an accomplishment," Staszewski said. "I'd like everyone to win one match, but that won't be easy. The caliber of competition is outstanding."

"We've made an overall improvement from the last two seasons. We had a losing season last year, and we've rebounded from that."

Harrison, champion of the Western Lakes Activities Association, was fifth in Class B the last two years but will stay home this year. Kingswood had 24 points, Andover 20 and the Hawks 15.

"IT'S A SHAME," Harrison coach Bernie Goldstein said. "We were fifth in the state for two years, and this is a better team this year. But, with Andover dropping down, we had three real good teams in the same regional."

Ironically, three WLAA teams (North, Plymouth Salem and Stevenson) that lost to Harrison in dual meets and the league tournament qualified for the Class A finals.

"It was just the luck of the draw," Goldstein said. "We could have gone to any other regional around here and could have won it or finished second."

Like Mercy, the Hawks got to the semifinals at every flight. Harrison's top performance was a second-place finish by the No. 1 doubles team of juniors Kristi Cornwell and Jodie Whitehead.

Freshman Stephanie Schwalm played first singles, and juniors Julie Heist, Lisa Tomlin and Jill Barringer competed at Nos. 2-4. The second doubles team consisted of senior Alisa Bamberken and sophomore Amy Tobie, and juniors Melissa Prendergast and Barb Ullberck comprised the third duo.

"In a dual match, we could play (Andover) pretty tough, but in a tournament it was hard to do," Goldstein said. "We were on the Kingswood half (of the bracket) more than they were, and that's what hurt us."

Goldstein said the Hawks will be back with another good team next year since they will graduate only two players (Whitehead and Bamberken).

"If we can have better luck in the regional, maybe we can go back to state," he said.

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
