Funds from the event are ear-marked for increased community outreach, education and marketing of the open housing center, which last year provided services for \$17' cilents who were considering a move, including 179 bomeowners and \$38 renters. The center also received over 1,000 telephone inquir-ies.

Each client is supplied with infor-mation about the ethnic and racial compositions of a community and its schools, and a list of Realtors and lending institutions committed to in-tegrated housing patterns.

To date, there have been 22 "pro-integrative moves," including five black families who purchased homes in Farmington Hills, three that pur-chased in West Bloomfield and one each in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Rochester Hills and Troy.

Another 100 families are either in Another 100 families are either in the process of purchasing new homes or are searching for new housing. Of total clients using services, 15 per-cent are white, 15 percent are ra-cially mixed couples and the remain-ing 70 percent are black or other ra-cial minorities.

"WITHOUT INTERVENTION, we see a continuing pattern of segregate of heighborhoods. Our goal is to achieve stable and integrated neighborhoods in Oakland County, to show that this is a good place for all people to live," Talley said.

"We see our mission as a catalyst for expanding efforts statewide. It does no good to have Oakland County integrated, when other parts of the state are not.

"There's lots of talk about things like this. We're doers."

The center is endorsed by 24 Oakland County municipalities and such other entities as the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments and New Detroit.

Funding is provided by grants from such sources as the City of Southfield, Oakland County and the Birmingham Unitarian Church in Bloomfield Hills. Last year's budget

was \$96,000.
