# Fumbles costly for Farmington

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for as senior Kevin McKenna recovered a Falcon fumble forced by a bone-crunching hit by senior cornerback Tony Grieb.

Farmington got the ball back, but an ill-advised pitch turned the ball over again. This time senior Rick Bennett scooped up the loose ball at Farmington's 37-yard line.

Eight plays later, senior Ed Jeannin scored on a 4-yard run. The extra point was blocked and Glenn led 6-0.

Glenn got the ball again when senior John Ward picked up another Farmington turnover, but both teams' offenses stalled until late in the second quarter.

"THE DEFENSE played great, but the offense played the worst it has all year, perhaps the worst in the past two years," Farmington coach Bernie Call said.

After Quattlander gained 34 yards on a draw play and moved the ball to Farmington's 21, the Falcon's David Monge intercepted Hewer and returned it to the Glenn 37. Hewer made a touchdown-saving tackle.

Farmington's momentum didn't last long as, on what looked like a replay of Monge's interception, Glenn's Gary Chmiel picked off Falcon quarterback David Link. Both teams combined for six first-half turnovers as Glenn led 6-0 at half-time.

"I figured we had the ballgame in control at half-time," Call said. "We were down by six and, if we could come out and score, we would be alright. But we had too many turnovers. They killed us. But we just

didn't drop the ball; they made some great hits on us."

The Rockets took control of the game on their first possession of the third quarter, driving 64 yards in 14 plays. The drive, which took 8:46, was capped by a Quattlander 2-yard run. Quattlander, who rushed for 54 yards, bounced off two tacklers for the score.

Glenn made it 14-0 after making a two-point conversion. Hewer hit a diving Ward in the corner of the end zone, who was able to get one foot in bounds.

ON THE SECOND play of the fourth quarter, Grieb intercepted Link at the Farmington 35. Three plays later, Ward scored on a dive from 3 yards. Chris Bandy's extra point made it 21-0.

McKenna recovered Farmington's fourth fumble to set up Glenn's last score. Senior Grayson Story carried the ball four straight times before finding the end zone as he broke free up the middle for a 4-yard TD run. Doug Hammond's extra point made it 28-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Farmington started at Glenn's 48, thanks to a late hit penalty. Another late hit penalty and a pass interference penalty moved the ball to the 11. Reserve quarterback Matt April found junior David Liszewski open for an 11-yard touchdown.

Farmington finished a tough three-week schedule, which included WLLA powers Glenn, North Farmington and Plymouth Salem. Even though the Falcons lost, it was obvious they are an improved team from last year's 0-5 finish in the division.

## Farmington 2nd in cross country

Farmington powered past host Westland John Glenn to finish second in Lakes Division boys cross country Thursday, 19-44.

Farmington's Dave Clineard outraced Glenn's Jeff Tapper to the finish line, taking first place in 17:13. Tapper was next at 17:24.

The Falcons captured the next six places to win going away. Mario Nor-din (17:49), Pat O'Dell (18:18), Jon Duff (18:21) and Scott Frump (18:25) figured in the scoring for Farmington.

John Lane and Tom May were seventh (18:29) and eighth (18:37) and helped the cause by pushing Glenn's next runners farther back.

The Falcons finish 4-1 in the Lakes and 4-2 overall. The Western Lakes Activities Association meet will be Wednesday afternoon at Cass Benton Park.

## Spartans beat North in showdown

Livonia Stevenson won the showdown for the Lakes Division championship in girls cross country Thursday, defeating North Farmington 24-31 at Oakland Community College.

North finished 4-1 in the division and 8-1 overall in dual meets. The Spartans won their half of the Western Lakes Activities Association with a 5-0 record.

In an individual duel, Stevenson's A.J. Koritnik nipped North's Emily Shively for first place.

Shively rallied in the last mile and had 50 yards remaining, but Koritnik won by a fraction of a second, 19:44.54 to 19:44.85.

"A.J. got a lean at the tape," North coach Bill Pinnell Jr. said. "It was a great race."

Others scoring for the Raiders were Kegan Keefover, fourth (21:05); Lisa Wantz, sixth (23); Jenny Web, ninth (21:51); and Alicia Crossland, 10th (21:58).

"Most of them ran close to their best times on our home course," Pinnell said. "I was pleased we had five under 22:00."

Bridget Mackinnon was third (20:51) for Stevenson, Emily Pratt (19:44), Stacy Pralls seventh (21:29) and Gail Grewe eighth (21:39).

The WLLA meet will be Wednesday at Cass Benton Park. Stevenson is the defending champion.

"We'll shoot for them at the WLLA and regional meets," Pinnell said. "Walled Lake Western (the Western Division dual winner) is going to be tough. I look for us to finish in the top three, but first place is up for grabs."
