PORK BARREL DISPUTE — The House voted 330 to 96 to spend nearly 4230 million on 88 "demonstration" highway projects located mostly in the districts of influential lawmakers. ## SENATE:

TO PASS FOREIGN AID — By a vote of 61 to 38, the Senate approved the conference report on legislation (HIR 2508) authorizing 255.3 billion in foreign milliary and economic aid in fiscat 1992-3. The bill provides limited funding of U.N. family planning, and requires U.S. goods to be shipped on more costly U.S.-flag exsels, among other disputed provisions.

Leading aid recipients over the two years are Israel, \$7.5 billion, and Egypt, \$4.2 billion. Among other amounts are \$2.2 billion for sub-Sa-hara Africa and \$778 million for
