Expansion of the courthouse, meant to accommodate a third district lodge and support staff, will be put before voters on Tuesday, Nov. 5, in the form of two ballot proposate — one for Farmington and another for Farmington Hills. Each city will have a different share of the total \$1.8 million bond proposal based on state equalized value and caseload stemming from each city.
