Cranbrook tells science secrets

How to make the goop that was so important to the Teenage Ninja Mutant Turtles will be explained at the "Interact and React: A Celebration of Chemistry" seminar at the Cranbrook Institute of Science. The demonstration of chemistry and related hand-on activities — which will tackle topics more important than Turtle goop — will be held 1-4:30 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 3, at the Institute. Participants in the program will get an opportunity to see the role chemistry has played in meeting basic needs of providing food, shelter,

health, energy and clean earth, air and water.

Organizers of the presentation said they want to reverse the declining involvement in the sciences by young people, "particularly girls and minorities."

An informational video focusing on the uses of chemistry in everyday life also will be shown.

Regular museum admission is \$4 for adults, \$3 for senior citizens and youths age 3 to 17 and free for children under age 3.
