

Marian avenges defeat

Senior center Lauro DeMatia ignited the Marian offense midway through the second quarter with six consecutive points, but the Mustangs continued to nail almost everything they shot. Marian led 33-16 at halftime.

"One thing that leaps out between this game and the earlier win is the rebounding," Baker said. "We controlled the boards in the first game, but their putbacks hurt us."

DeMatia paced Marian's attack with 11 points. Senior guard Kathleen Berrigan had seven assists but might have had more if not for her teammates missing some easy shots after she set them up.

Senior guard Michele Coughlin and Junior Tara Walsh also had strong games for Marian. Coughlin had 15 points and 10 rebounds, while Walsh added 12 points and seven rebounds.

MERCY BEGAN to press in the third quarter and cut the Marian lead to 35-24 with 3:53 remaining in the quarter. The Mustangs called timeout and when play resumed the ball was inbound to Storen,

who nailed a 10-foot banker to start another Marian rally. Storen only had two baskets in the second half, but the bank shot essentially clinched the victory for the Mustangs.

Marian extended its lead to 44-26 as the game neared its end. Mercy hurt itself several times with traveling violations.

"It's the second game we've gotten off to a putrid start, but that problem lays at my doorstep," said Baker, whose team opened the Catholic playoffs on the road Thursday. "We're a resilient group and we've worked hard for the wins we've got. I'm confident the kids will bounce back and play hard in the playoffs."

The Mustangs' lead reached its biggest margin of the night with 5:00 remaining at 51-30. After DeMatia scored the next four points, a ball thrown out of bounds hit the light switch and the lights went out. The vaporized lights needed 20 minutes to warm-up and come back on.

"It happened a couple years ago and then we put a cage over the switch," Lillio-Cicerone said. "I don't know what happened to the cage."


Entry blanks are at bowling centers all over town or call 546-0070. The DWBA 67th annual city championship will open March 7, 1992. Entry forms are out now.
