Smith has top campaign treasury

As of Oct. 20, challenger Joanne Smith had received the most cam-paign money, followed by Farming-ton Hills City Council incumbent Larry Lichtman and challenger Paul

Sowerby.
Following right behind Sowerby in money received in the race for four seats on the Farmington Hills City Council is challenger Ronald Oliver-

Next in line after Oliverio are in-cumbents Nancy Bates and Terry Sever. Write-in candidate Andrew Racckowski took last position in money raised.

The campaign finance reports are on fille with the Farmington Hills City Cierk. Candidates were re-quired by state law to file their pre-election reports by Oct. 25 with the Oakland County elections clerk. Can-didates also are required to file a

post-election report in December that will give a full documentation of money raised and spent throughout her race. Smilh, a former councilwoman and current chair of the planning commission, has received \$6,520 contributions and spent \$4,673. But she has debts totalling \$5,340.13, which includes repayment of a \$3,500 loan to herself, payment for a party at Ginopolis and a \$1,200 printing bill.

LICHTMAN, A two-year council-man, raised \$8,449 in contributions, including a \$1,000 donation from his parents. Itis contributions include a previous campaign committee bal-ance of \$485. He has \$348 of tin-kind contributions, including from Gary Jonna, executive vice president of Jonna Cos. Lichtman, a former plan-ning commission and zoning board of appeals member, has spent \$4,812. He has \$850 debts listed, He also

received loans of varying amounts equaling \$705, including from almostell.

Sowerby, a former appointed councilman and former zoning board of appeals chairman and parks and recreation commissioner, raised \$5,407 and has expenditures of \$4,4087, which is also listed as a debt. He received \$400 in-kind contributions.

Oliverio, a former candidate de-feated in the 1989, raised \$4,220 and spent \$4,017. He has a \$3,500 debt listed. His campaign finance report.

also lists \$3,500 in loans, including from himself.

Two-year councilwoman Nancy Bates received \$3,260 in contribu-tions and spent \$2,594. She has in-kind contributions listed of \$477 and debts of \$1,356. She loaned herself \$1,350.
