Flooding problems leave residents fed up

Residents in Farmington's Bel Aire subdivision say they are fed up with basement flooding problems and a recent Farmington High School project which they believe could be making their problems

could be making their problems worse.

"We cannot fully enjoy our homes because of the problems," sid Richard Hoy, who has lived in the subdivision for 14 months and recently wrote to the city of Farmington about the neighborhood concerns. Neighbors said they wanted something done about the flooding problem, and asked that the city assessor review their property assessments, which they believe should be lowered due to the problems. City Manager Robert Deadman said Bel Air residents have experienced problems over the years because of the weeping file system under the basements there, and where the subdivision is located. If too much storm water from too many house gets into the tile system, it is pumped into the sanitary sewer system. When that overloads, it backs up into residents' basements. Bel Aire, he said, is at the 'low end of the outlet."

Public services director Earl Billing said recent sewer work on nearby Mooney Street, which removed some of the commercial buildings from the drain they shared with Bel Aire, should help the situation.

Deadman said the city would also be checking to ensure that residents have moved their downspouts at least five feet away from the house and that the ground slopes away from the houses.
