Also back are Dathawn Stewart, a 6-lost guard from Derioti Rediord noted for his defense and jumping ability; Dar-in Brandt, a 5-9 guard from Clarksion with strong pas-ing ability and Khari Maxwell, a 6-5 forward from Au-burn 1018 Oakland Christian who possessed, all-oround ability — garticularly on defense. Two newromers Reed is counting on are Larry Dan-lels, a 6-7, 230-pound widebody from Detroit Cooley who can dominate inside, and Dale Craft, a 6-6 forward from

Romeo. Both are transfers, Daniels from Navarro (Tex-as) CC and Craft from Macomb CC, both can score; and both should start. Rod Hall, a 6-foot guard from Roseville, is another transfer from Macomb CC who should start in the backcourt. "He's just a good player," said Reed. He feels the same way about Bill Knight, a 6-6 for-ward from Clarkston, Myron Banks, a 6-6 forward from Detroit Redford; and Troy Coleman, a 6-2 guard from Dearborn St. Alphonsus.

AND THEN there's the three local talents: Bill Thurs-ton, a 6-5 forward from Rochester who redshirted last year after breaking his toc; Kevin Woodmore, a 5-9 guard from Auburn Hills Avordale with great quickness and defensive ability; and Scott Ross, a 6-5 sophornore from Walled Lake Central who played some last year. Reed figures this team will be superior to last sea-son's in many ways. Gone are Devin Bell (now at Austin Peay), Starlin Stevens (Wisconsin-Parkside), Ed Whitak-er (Michigan Tech) and Jerry Prieskorn (was at St. Lou-is University, but has since left school).

"I think we'll be a better pressing team than in the post," he said. "We have excellent defensive guards, and we've got good size and depth. We're awfully strong through 13 players.

through 13 players. But — In keeping with a longtime coaching tradition — Reed can see plenty of areas for improvement. "I think were weak defensively on our front line," he said, "Were a good rebounding team, and there's a wide range of ways we can beat you. We can run, we can press, and we're big enough to play any style we have to beat you. to beat you.

"But we're going to have to play better interior de-fense, and we're going to have to improve our perimeter shooting."

Harrison places 13th in 'B'

Farmington Hills Harrison, com-peting for the first time at the state level, finished 13th in the Class B boys cross country championships Saturday in Big Rapids. "At first we were disappointed," Harrison coach John Reed said, "but we have to put things in gerspective. "Three years ago we were 0.9, lost every meet and were last at School-craft. It's only been thee years and already we moved up to 13th in the state."

The Hawks, who won a regional championship, had hoped to finish in

the top five. Fremont won the team title for the second time in three years with 122 points. Harrison scored 351. "There were a heckwa lot of teams sitting at home Saturday," Reed said. "The kids already are talking about going back next year.

"THEY KNOW we'll be in Class A, but we beat very team in the West-ern Lakes (Activities Association) except (Walled Lake) Western and they were second in the state." Harrison's top runner Jason Zdyr-ski was most affected by the 20-de-gree weather and finished 65th (18.01). Mike Deans placed 37th

(17.44), Justin Droyer 49th (17.51), Par Larsson 95th (18.23) and Tim Bitson 105th (18.20), Freshmen Toid Janey and Jastin Konore were 105th and 117th out of 165 runners at 18.31 and 18.41, respectively.
