It took hours of phone calls, weeks of soliciting ads and auction donations, and the physical labor of constructing the catwalk, all to raise funds for the Detroit Institute of Arts Youtheater.

The first Faux, Fash & Flash attracted more than 300 partygoers to the soiree of fashion, style, food, entertainment, celebrities and a live auction Oct. 27.
