DNR overhaul impedes trash plan go-ahead

A recount of key precincts in last week's election on Oakland County's solid waste program will cost \$2,000, according to the head of a group op-posed to the incinerator proposed in

and Waterford townships where pa-per ballots were used in the Nov. 5 election, said Diane L. Pederson, president of Help Oakland Preserve the Environment.

have made it impossible for offi-cials to move, rapidly or otherwise, said Roger Smith, county deputy di-rector of solid waste management. "But we hope to get the revised IGAs (intergovernmental agree-ments) out to the individual com-munities by the end of the year," said Smith. "They will have until April to act on them."

"But there's definitely going to be a recount," she said.
Those interested in challenging the results of last week's election—one of the closest in county history—have a tight schedule.
The election results are expected to be certified Theaday. After that, challengers have air days—or the close of business Nov. 25— to recoust a reconst.

On the ballot Nov. 5 was a proposad at on financing the proposed \$500 million Oakland County solid waste program, including a controversial incinerator in Auburn Hills.

Uncertified results showed the proposal passing 70,908 to 70,885, a difference of 223 votes.

The election set two benchmarks

recycling portion of the solid waste program approved last week 70,008 to 70,858. But changes in Lansing make it difficult. "We can't just move ahead, even though we got a yes vote," Smith said. "We can't even get going on re-cycling."

GOV. JOHN ENGLER surprised Oakland County officials — and others — last week by announcing be wants to reorganize the DNR. Among other things, the governor would eliminate the Air Pollution Control Commission, the agency that

was to hold public hearings on Oak-land's proposed incinerator before acting os its operating permit. That's a significant change, said Smith. If only because county offi-cials—as well as those still opposed to the incinerator proposed in Au-burn Hills—don't know what agen-cy would perform that function. "We've been in contact with the governor's office," Smith said. "They said the changes (in the DNR) are too extensive to fax and they'd mail them to us. So far (Wednesday morn-ing) we don't have them yet." Smith said he is also concerned

about changes DNR officials have told him they want in Oakland's 611 plan. He hasn't seen the proposed changes. Furthermore, Smith said he is confident they can be made. But it adds to the uncertainty, "he said.

Residents concerned that Oakland might be forced to import trash to keep the incinerator operating will be encouraged by one change Smith said the DNR wants.

"They (DNR officials) want specifics on our import-export policies," Smith said. "They want specifics about the trash Oakland imports and exports."

CURRENTLY THE courty's 641 plan states Oakland is striving for a point at which it will neither import or export trash, Smith said. "But we let the market forces operate. We

we let the market forces operate. We don't impose restrictions.

"The DNR wants specifics about when and how trash will be imported or exported." Smith continued. "Otherwise the DNR will close the borders." Another specific the DNR is asking for, Smith said, is our emergency plan. The county has contingency plans to take its trash to other counties if that ever becomes necessary.


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
