Accidental tourists on pop front?

Amid the buzz from the frontal guitar attack, Happy Accidents' lead singer Paul Einhaus realizes he's not being heard.

He doesn't atomp his feet or throw a fit. Instead, he calmly removes the hair from his yees and cordulally asks the sound man to give his micro-hone a boach.

hair from his eyes and cordially asks the sound man to give his microphone a boost.

And Einhaus says thank you, not once but twice.
But don't confuse politeness for jopp passivity. Happy Accidents will floss your teeth with their sized guitar strings, tearing through a gauntlet of ripe songs with unequivocal zeal on this night at Lill's 21.

'I think when you're playing live you play things faster because your adrenalin is pumping.' said Einhaus, who lives in Farmington.

Happy Accidents curry contradiction. On the one band, there is this pop band with a lead singer whose voice cracks with unierability as he tackles the universal postpibe-scent pop themes about universal postpibe-care mythical girls fancied.

Then there is this band — guitarist klike Crimmins, bassiat Steve Presti, Crummer Jim Faulkner and Einhaus

— with the sonic crunch of punk without the sneer or the posturing. Listen to the outfit's seven-song compact disc. "Mouthful of the Sun." (Permanent Records, Box 173, Farmington 48332), and call them purveyors of infectious pop melodies. They won't mind.

BUT THEIR hooks won't merely sway you to their mediancholia, angal-ridden world view. They plerce the sensibilities and offer no bandages for the wounds. "I think what's missing in music today is that songwriters are afraid to embarrass themselves a little bit." Einhaus said. "I think you should expose yourself a little bit." Undoubtedly, Einhaus does that as the front man for the Happy Accidents willing to drape his soul over the microphone while stabbing away at his guitar on stage. Einhaus doesn't immediately. the microphone while stabbing away at his guitar on stage. Einhaus doesn't immediately

strike you as someone who had a career history of playground pugilism. Rather, he comes across as someone who felt alienated during the whole process of growing up and is just feeling the need to strike back.

Or, at least that's what songs such as "All My Teachers Were Failures" would suggest.

"Tm in my mid-20s and I think I would've gotten over that by now," sald Einhaus, 1982 graduate of Farmington High School. "I did hate high school, but that's beside the point. It was a good title for a song." TEENAGE REBELLION, though, did serve Static Alphabet, Einhaus previous band that also included Crimmins for all of a few weeks That group was laden with punk-inspired humor, not to mention a bit of the slooppiness associated with the late-Tos sound.

Happy Accidents was formed with

an intent to mold a brash '80s sound and '60s pop musings into a combustible form. Einhaus rejoined Crimmins and added Faulkner — both of whom were members of the Dancing Smoothles. Presti joined in April from Standing Shadows, replacing Sieve Carlson who was on bass for the recording of 'Mouthful of Sun.'

The band has sought to find 'the marriage' of pop and punk stylings on the stage at clubs such as Lill's, 3-D, Finney's Pub and Paycheck's. The four-man outfit has had brief tours of the Midwest. A record deal would be fine, but not the sole catalyst in performing.

Initially, one might be taken in by the group's keen pop sensibilities but the ungilded passion in their performances whose pools over in the long haul.
