DENAY HAS been a Sister of Mercy for 69 years, which she calls the greatest joy of her life. A native of the Bay City, Mich., area, she grew up on a farm. She was the fifth in a family of swen children. One brother became a priest, one sister a nun. "The only thing I ever wanted for Christmas was a box of paints. I always was drawing." Denay studded at the Art Institute of Chicago, Michigan State University and the University of Notre Dame.
