(MADD) headquarters in Livonia, they're counting the days until the New Year. That's because new, tougher state drunk driving laws will go into effect Jan 1, capping nearly a decade of lobbying from MADD and its sup-orders.

"We may even have a little celo-bration here," said Sandi Wolf, ad-ministrator of the Wayne County MADD Chapter. This is something we've sought for a long, long time."
