# Palace, Fox owners vie for Meadow Brook

Talks almed at privatizing the (inancially strapped Meadow Brook Music Festival at Oakland University are approaching the serious stage, with two prominent southeastern Michigan promoters vying with each other for the contract.

Arena Associates Inc., operators of the Palace of Auburn Hills and the New Pine Knob, and Olympia Arenas Inc., which runs the Fox Thestre and the Joe Lewis Arena, are negotiating with OU for the contract 20 run the popular but fiscally unpound summer series.

"We are in the discussion phase,"
said OU interim president John H.
De Carlo. "We want to determine if
it's viable to have a promoter opertate the festival under terms, conditions and requirements established

"Rut one thing is very important,"

De Carlo sald. "The music festival will continue to be an integral part of Oakland University."

The Meadow Brook Music Festival is currently operated by OU he school's east campus in Rochester. It has been the summer bome the Detroit Symphony Orchestra since 1964 and the sit. of popular concerts since. 1970.

BUT THE SERIES has fallen on financial hard times over the last decade or so because of a number of factors such as increased competition and bad weather.

As of last February — when OU turned over seven concerts to Cellar Door Productions — the festival's accumulated deficit was \$921,717.

Turning over the concerts to Cellar Door wasn't anything new, said De Carlo, who noted that OU had previously contracted with other promoters on a limited scale.

But it might have been a hint of things to come.

Last summer, the festival fea-tured 45 concerts — 15 fewer than in 1990 — featuring a wide range of artists, including Victor Borge, the Boston Pops Orchestra, Smoky Rob-inson, Morrissey and Indigo Girls.

Many were sell-outs, said Frank Cardimen, assistant to the OU vice president for external affairs. "It was a very successful season.

"I can't speak for Cellar Door, but I understand those seven concerts ere among the most successful." Even so, the series "didn't quite break even," Cardiman sald.
With last summer fresh in their
minds, OU officials this month are
expected to discuss turning over
more if not all of the concerts to private promoters, according to De
Carlo. The Board of Trustes will
likely address the idea early next

TRUSTEES, HOWEVER, are already thinking about the problem, and weighing the options. OU contacted several promoters, but they have narrowed the prospects to two.

Arena. Associates and Olympia Arenas.

"We are only in the discussion stages," said trustee James A. Sharp Jr. of Detroit. "But the idea deserves consideration. In a competitive area like this one, we (OU) are just not geared up to compete with the people who run the Palace or the Fox Theatre."

Another trustee, Andrea L. Fisher of Birmingham, summarized her thoughts this way. "I don't know that the university should be in the business of running a music festival.

"If we put it in the hands of professionals, the university wins all the way around. We get the benefits of professional promotion and we get the benefits of any improvements the contractor might make ... and we make money regardless of rainy weather or poor attendance."

Trustee L. Brooks Patterson of Drayton Plains said discussion on contracting out the festival is long overdue. "OU is a great university, but a lousy promoter," he said. "The sooner we move to privatize the festival, the better."

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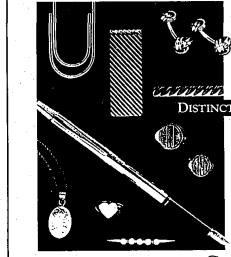
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
